Mr. John Mitch: Can I get a motion to approve 55 Resolutions by consent?

Council Vice President Small moved the adoption of the foregoing Resolutions. The motion was seconded by Councilman Bauer and carried unanimously.

Mr. John Mitch: Any questions or comments?

Councilman Small: I would like to abstain on #50 please.

Council President, DeJesus: We will now move to the public portion of the meeting, please approach the microphone in the back. If you would like, state the area of the township you live in and your name, there is a one time, five-minute time period.

Public Meeting:

Mr. John Mitch: asked if there were other comments from the public this evening.

Gebron Abdulhai, Fords: Talked about the racial injustice in Woodbridge for black residents, the democratic government failure to perform its basic functions and not responding to the people's needs, the government's inaction and the Council's non-response to the painted blue line.

Mr. John Mitch: asked if there were other comments from the public this evening.

Jimmy Dabrowski, Woodbridge: Spoke about the Human Rights Commission meeting, thanked Councilman Ficarra and Councilman Anderson for attending the meeting, invited the rest of the Council members and the Mayor to attend the meeting and accept recommendations that help Woodbridge Township to become more inclusive, more equitable and anti-racist. Talked about the teal line for ovarian cancer awareness month and the WYLE's desire to work with the Council and the Mayor, on anti-racist systemic policies to benefit all residents. Expressed his hate to the racist system of white supremacy and his desire for everybody to thrive.

Council President DeJesus: Reminded that everyone has the right to their five minutes.

Mr. John Mitch: asked if there were other comments from the public this evening.

Council President DeJesus asked Christo if we would talk or would keep recording and reminded him on being respectful of one another's different opinions.

Christo, Middlesex County: Spoke about Councilman Kyle Anderson, the destruction of Lincoln Annex School, his conversations with the Freeholders, the Middlesex County Improvement Authority, the New Brunswick Board of Education, the New Brunswick's Planning and Zoning Boards and Town Council. He also spoke on the Vietnam vet and member of the Woodbridge Post of the American Legion, Robert Hamel, on Jimmy Dabrowski, and on how he supports Council President DeJesus. Mr. Christo apologized to Councilman Spillar and asked Council President DeJesus if she would accept his flowers.

Council President DeJesus: Told Christo how he was disrupting the meeting, thanked him for having the gesture of bringing her flowers, asked him to put them on the back table, and if he wanted to be escorted out of the Council Chambers because his time was up.

Mr. John Mitch: asked if there were other comments from the public this evening.

Charity Daramola, Sewaren: Brought a couple of questions to the meeting: 1. What advances have been made regarding WYLE's demands? 2. Is the Human Rights Commission working with the Council directly or it is just simply the Mayor? 3. What steps has the Council taken besides the creation of Mr. Anderson's Committee regarding gender, race and disabilities? 4. When will the Council have an open forum with the Mayor to include Community members? 5. What efforts are the Council making to get the Mayor here? 6. What are the updates for the budget? 7. When is the Budget Hearing going to be? Ms. Daramola told how she understands that the State of New Jersey has to give some clearances to the Council. Her last question is on what effort has the Council taken and put in place to help the township with Covid, especially with the students?

Councilman Anderson asked Ms. Daramola to repeat question #4 and the question about his committee.

Councilman Ficarra: Responded to Ms. Daramola's question #1 and said: "In regards of that, I know that I said it, the last time we had a meeting; I don't know if other members have done it, but I requested a meeting with the Domestic Violence Response Team somewhere along the line that came up. So, I met their two leaders privately, and then with the Business Administrator, and asked a lot of questions, gained a lot of knowledge, and that was directly associated to your demand from my perspective. Just today, I requested a meeting, and again this is just me, people can speak for themselves. I requested a meeting with Dr. Nolan and her Substance Abuse Response Team, and I also requested a meeting to talk about the procedures for dealing with people with mental impact. And those are things that you all, at some point, not necessarily just you, but the WYLE brought up that I think that just really registered with me and that I needed to gain more knowledge. So as I do that, I would be happy to chat with anybody on it. You know it is fresh I have tons of notes you know from that perspective. Not just me, but other people I believe and maybe not, they can speak for themselves, but as much as I personally support the police. I am going to support the police whether there is a blue line on Main Street or not. I am still going to support them. However, I recognize that it was a problem for a lot of people so that I did voice my opinion that I respect the police. I know we have police here; I would say anywhere, those of you that know me, my son is a police officer, not in this town. But I could also recognize that it was hurting other people or hurting their feelings. So from the beginning I thought that once the recognition of law enforcement was over, I thought that we would move on. I am a fan of supporting a lot of different groups personally. So I don't want to dominate this but those are just a few little things that were prompted by you.

Council President DeJesus: Responded to Ms. Daramola's question #2 by saying that the Human Rights Commission doesn't report to us per se. They don't work with us, they are their own entity, but whatever they are going to meet with people and they are going to talk about whatever the issues are. They are

going to report I have Human Rights Commission on my agenda. So they are going to report to the Administration to see what else they can do as far as resources. They can pull in order to address the issues that they have been brought up. I will always report whatever report they have during our Council meetings. Just for everybody's knowledge, the Human Rights Commission will always be on the agenda of the Presiding Council President.

Councilman Anderson: Responded to Ms. Daramola's question #3. Council President, I will say that there have been other Council members who have approached me about coming on to the calls that we have weekly. So I have been trying to arrange the schedule, so that we can have them all on, so they can talk about how they can help in that capacity, so I will mention that there have been other council members that have asked being on those Saturday morning meetings.

Council President De Jesus: Responded to Ms. Daramola's questions #4 & 5, and said that it is not mandatory for the Mayor to be at our Council meetings; we are here. We have expressed the request and we can keep making the request known to him and that is as far as we can do. She reminded Christo to keep on one spot to record with his handheld device and not keep moving back and forth. Regarding the Covid-19 with the schools, that is an issue that you can bring up to the Board of Ed. We don't make any decisions regarding the schools.

Councilman Anderson: Council President, I want to congratulate you on a very successful "Backpack Program" that the WYLE organization ran and I thought it was very commendable, and you reached out to the entire Community with that. This is a very difficult time because there are parents that are considered essential employees that have to go back to work, and their children do not have a resource center where they can go and study. I field those calls a lot in my office where parents are looking for resources. One of the things that my neighbors are doing, some of our residents are doing very well, is this is forcing many of our neighbors rely on one another and connect. My former neighborhood, we all carpooled together so now we are seeing that a lot of families are getting together, where they are rotating on who will have the kids to work at their home for Monday and who will have the kids to work at their home for Tuesday. It's time like this where we have to rely on one another. I will say that the Edison Recreation Center which used to be known as the Jewish Community Center, that is a place where kids can go, students can go for a resource center and go and learn while their parents are at work, and there are some gyms that are also accepting students as well. Because you don't have to necessarily be a group leader or teacher to supervise the kids, while they are learning on their computer screen. There just have to be an internet and an open space and obviously socially distant. But there are some businesses that are opening up their doors to students, when their parents have to go back to work. I encourage people to seek those businesses out, but the one that I mentioned was the Recreation center in Edison right now. I don't know Mr. Cimilluca, are our Recreation Centers doing anything?

Mr. Cimilluca responded to Councilman Anderson: "Not at this time. They are open for child care; so, if someone wants to register their children for child care, we are doing it at the Club of Woodbridge, thank you."

Council President DeJesus: Responded Ms. Daramola's questions #6 & 7. I don't have any update on the budget as of now, thank you. She also told Christo if he had any other concerns, he could email them to the Council.

Mr. Mitch asked if there were other comments from the public this evening.

Councilman Ficarra: Council President, I just want one thing along the line with our Councilman Anderson was saying. I just want to check on my emails, the Raritan Bay YMCA of Perth Amboy is offering child care during the day with the computer, so students have access to remote learning. Director that is something that we could consider to look at. I certainly be happy to connect our Director with the Director of YMCA in Perth Amboy to see how they formatted that.

Mr. Mitch asked if there were other comments this evening from the public.

Meshal Bannerman, Avenel: Spoke about his frustrations, the lack of progress, the Human Rights Commission, the Mayor's administration at large, the issues linked to the town policing and the solutions to rectify those issues, the misinterpretation of the rationale behind their demands as a sign of lack of leadership, the lack of respect for the town's residents, the Mayor attending to a police ceremony not wearing a mask, and not exercising social distancing as well the Chief Police and the new Police Officers, about defunding the police and why they can't wait any longer.

Mr. Mitch asked if there were other comments this evening from the public.

Victoria Birch, Colonia: Spoke about the Human Rights Commission, the blue line painted teal for Ovarian Cancer and how she is in favor of the town showing support for additional causes. She also commented on the township's lack of accountability, the lack of support to Black Lives Matter, and the WYLE's frustrations. Then Ms. Birch mentioned about the Mayor and the Human Rights Commission meeting.

Mr. Mitch asked if there were other comments this evening from the public.

Council Vice President Small made a motion to close the public portion of the meeting which was seconded by Councilman Bauer and carried unanimously.

Councilman Anderson: I would like to ask if you could change the Minority Community Relations Panel; the name has been changed to the Woodbridge Organization of Neighbors Advocating Change. I will send it to you in an email Mr. Mitch. But they now have a mission statement, they have committees, and I do want to just address one thing that Mr. Christo continually brings us up about the school of New Brunswick. This is a decision that was made by the New Brunswick Board of Education. Old Saint Peter's High School was purchased back in 2014 by the New Brunswick Board of Education. There was K-4 School there on a 1.75 acre property that the school was on. It had no parking; they had no

playground and it was directly across the street from Robert Wood Johnson. If you know the area, that school was no longer a neighborhood; less the 50% of the students lived in the neighborhood of that school. Robert Wood Johnson had been looking at that property for a very long time and they approached the New Brunswick Board of Education about turning it into a cancer center and they purchased that school from them, which was approved by the New Brunswick Board of Education. They are then in turn going to have the students of that school going to an existing school which is known as the Pathway. I just want to make it clear that this was a decision of the New Brunswick Board of Education, and they have not only purchased that, but they are building the school for those students for free. While the school is being built for them, they will, be housed in the Pathways of Technology School, which is a federally funded school for students of high school age, but it was a corporate property. They are not going to get cancer; the school property was remediated so that students can go there. Students have now been going there for two years and then they will then be moved to a campus with 4.5 acres and they will have playground, they will have a state-of-the-art school, and they will have ample parking and there will be in a neighborhood where more of the students live. This was a decision by the New Brunswick Board of Education; my office, as Executive County Superintendent, I am in between that decision and the Department of Education. I review the land acquisition, the land disposal that they are getting rid of and the actual architectural drawings of all the school. After months of review, we agreed with the New Brunswick Board of Education, and we sent it to the Department of Education for their consideration. At no time did we make the decision in my office to get rid of the school. That was a decision by the New Brunswick residents and the New Brunswick Board of Education, and in that time I have continuously reached out to the residents of New Brunswick and I have received one phone call, which was returned and we spoke to that resident. So, either they are content with the decision or I am missing something, but Mr. Christos, who claims to be advocating for them and calling me a racist, while holding a racist flag, while I was speaking, just speaks for himself. And, I am sorry, I lost my composure about someone needing a job, okay. That is all.
