**B. AN ORDINANCE APPROVING THE APPLICATION FOR A LONG TERM TAX EXEMPTION AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A FINANCIAL AGREEMENT WITH DUKE REALTY AVENEL URBAN RENEWAL, LLC. (19-108)**

Tom Maras, Fords: With regard to Ordinance B can you give us an explanation of what property is getting exempted, for how long and why?

Council President Spillar: Reference is 1 Paddock Street Duke Realty. At the present time it is vacant land and it is a proposed warehouse.

Tom Maras: Okay, what is the size of that warehouse and how long will that...will it be a thirty year tax abatement?

Council President Spillar: One hundred eighty-five thousand square foot and I believe it is thirty year, yes.

Tom Maras: Has there been a value described to that yet does the administration know?

Council President Spillar: None as of yet.

Tom Maras: Thank you very much.

Council President Spillar: Thank you.

Councilman Ficarra: Council President I just want to make sure I have this right on that property that was just referred to currently paying real estate taxes of \$61,000.00 annually and after the project it will go on up to \$468,375.00 in the first year and will grow. Am I correct?

Council President Spillar: Correct.

Councilman Ficarra: Okay thank you.

Council President Spillar: Councilman Ficarra in addition it will create two hundred and fifty construction jobs and then once the project is completed it will have one hundred and fifty permanent jobs in the township.

Councilman Ficarra: Alright, thank you.

Council Vice President DeJesus moved the public hearing closed and this Ordinance be adopted and submitted to the Mayor for approval, which was seconded by Councilman Small and carried unanimously.

Council Vice President DeJesus moved the adoption of the foregoing Resolutions. The motion was seconded by Councilman Small and carried unanimously except for Councilman Bauer abstaining from Resolution 10, 11 and 12.

**PUBLIC MEETING:**

Council President Spillar: We will now turn to the mayor. Mayor I believe you have a statement.

Mayor John E. McCormac: I would like to start by asking people to keep in their prayers the pilot of a single engine Cessna type plane that crashed his plane today into a home at 84 Berkley Avenue in Colonia. Very fortunately there was nobody in the house at the time although there was a car in the driveway and everybody thought there was but there was not. Mother, father and a six year old girl that goes to Claremont Avenue School just around the corner were not home. The grandma is often at the house and she was not there which was very fortunate. The house was completely destroyed. Next door at 80 Berkley Avenue there was a woman home who heard the noise and went outside, saw the fire and escaped with her two dogs; they were the only occupants of the home. On the other side, 88 Berkley Avenue, there was nobody home. All three families are being cared for. They have shelter and their insurance companies were out. One is at relatives and the other two are at hotels. They are all doing well and I spoke to all three today. They know that we are around to help with whatever is needed. I need to really praise the emergency service workers in the township. The police department was on the

scene immediately and the Colonia Fire Department, which is all volunteers, was on the scene immediately. They were fortunately out on a drill and were right around the corner and they got there very, very quickly. I don't know Mike Perazolli and I'm hoping I'm pronouncing his name right he is the 2<sup>nd</sup> Assistant Chief. He just got put into that position; he's acting 2<sup>nd</sup> Assistant Chief because he wasn't even sworn in yet. He was in control of the fire. He's a very young man. I saw him work. I don't know anything about fire emergency services but I could see the way he handled himself. He had his computer laid out in front of him, he had backup, and he was talking to everybody controlling the scene and handled it in a very professional and very mature manner. All nine of our fire districts responded. Six other towns responded South Plainfield, Carteret, Rahway, Metuchen, South Amboy and Perth Amboy. I've spoken to two of those mayors and I'll spoke to the rest to thank them for coming out. It was just a monumental effort. It's a small community and the houses are reasonably close together. Three are no longer inhabitable. It could have been thirty-three. When we heard, you know, a plane crashed in Colonia it's not something anybody here has ever heard before as far as I know so none of us knew what to expect when we were driving to the scene but thank goodness our fire departments and our police departments and our emergency management people were on the scene, took complete control of it and it was just handled incredibly well and I can't express how proud I am of the effort our men and women of the fire department, police department and EMTs how well they did their job. The township has set up an emergency fund for the next four days. Anybody can send a check or bring a check or gift cards for any major store that any reasonable family would shop at especially considering there is a six year old girl. You can bring the checks or the gift cards to the Evergreen Center between 8:30 A.M. and 8:30 P.M. tomorrow, Thursday and Friday and then Saturday between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. We're open from 8:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. We have volunteers that will be situated there at night so the place will be completely covered. Anybody can bring a check there or mail it to the township. The address of the Evergreen Senior Center is 400 Inman Avenue. As usual Councilwoman Debbie Meehan and I jumped on this immediately. Everybody knows the work she does in Colonia. I don't know why but it seems like there is an awful lot that happens there when people get sick and when there are tragedies Debbie is always the first one to jump in on it so she worked with us to set up that fund. It's the regular Woodbridge Community Charity Fund. Checks can be made payable to the fund. Again you can mail them to the Town Hall, you can give them to any Council person, give them to me or give them to anybody who works for the town and they will see that it gets to us. Then I told all three families that next week early we will divide everything up by three and get it out to the families. So again it's a very, very sad situation but fortunately and amazingly and miraculous a plane crashed in town and no civilians on the ground were injured not even one bit so we are very, very fortunate. And again the emergency services, fire police and EMTs acted quickly to make sure that the property damage was minimal and it was just an all-around terrific effort by our township workers.

Council President Spillar: Thank you Mayor. Do you want to roll into your biweekly Council agenda report?

Mayor John E. McCormac: As you know I usual talk every meeting about what happened in the past three weeks. I always mention each Council person and what they did but there was so much since October 8<sup>th</sup> that I'm not going to say who went to what I'm just going to tell you everything that has been going on. We had a ribbon cutting of the Hickory Senior Center in Fords, it's a beautiful new center, its' our fourth senior center. We have the grand opening of the Red Oak building in Sewaren which is right next to the Sycamore Senior Center. All the residents of Stern Tower were moved over there. We have a new supermarket coming to Hopelawn, Super Fresh, which is taking over the long empty Pathmark Store. I know the people in Hopelawn, Fords and Keasbey are thrilled that finally something happened there after so many years of that being vacant. The boundless handicapped accessible playground at Matthew Jago School, which has been down for fourteen months since August



of 2018, was rebuilt. The insurance took a while to work through but our Park Department and the Board of Ed did a good job to get that up and running. The Cypress Rec Center playing field where the ground is going to be a level playing where kids in crutches or wheelchairs can get on this surface and play baseball, softball or soccer is a terrific facility. We also celebrated the reopening of the café between 10:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M. at 881 West Avenue at the Cypress Center. There is a kitchen and RISE Program which is all the special needs kids between 18 and 21 working there for them every day between 10:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M. They are servers, greeters, cooks and dishwashers everything possible and it's an amazing facility and these kids have a tremendous opportunity to get jobs and if you could have seen the picture of them when they got their first paycheck it was just unbelievable. We had the groundbreaking for our new History Museum at 84 Green Street in a house that was built back in 1877. We had the Community Day Program at the Community Center to recognize over fifty volunteers who were nominated by their different organizations for all the work they do. We had the BaronFest at Parker Press Park, the Mayor's Health Expo at the Health Center which was the best one we've ever seen, a whole host of Halloween events for the kids, the Ghost Walk, pumpkin painting, Stuff the Scarecrow and the best ever Trunk or Treat on Main Street. Eighteen different businesses opened up their doors and people went in and out; it was an absolutely terrific day. I want to announce that Councilwoman Meehan was named Citizen of the Year by the Woodbridge Metro Chamber of Commerce. We have over sixty former athletes from Woodbridge High, Colonia High and JFK High inducted into the Township Athletic Hall of Fame. The Columbus Day celebration was a success and we had almost thirty restaurants at the Taste of Woodbridge event so the last three weeks have been very, very busy. As I said I can't mention who was at each one it would take forever but all of you were at the majority of those events and we thank you for your support and we thank the entire community of Woodbridge for supporting all those events too. Thank you Council President.

Council President Spillar: Thank you Mayor. As usual I want to thank my fellow Council mates for all the work they put in the last few weeks. We had a lot of great events and a lot of great services offered to the township. Really quick just to reiterate what you had said about today's incident I happened to get on the scene within four minutes and what an unbelievable job by all the men and women in this room. You don't give yourselves a round of applause for something like this but at a tragic situation like this I saw firsthand the professionalism of our police department, our fire departments, our emergency services and our CERT. You know you were all up to the scene and you never know what to expect so great job. We will now move into the public portion of the meeting. Please approach the microphone if you would like. State the area of the township that you live in or the municipality that you live in and there is a five minute time limit.

James Distlecamp from Jackson who is the PBA President read a statement he prepared and it read as follows. As the Woodbridge PBA President I'm here to represent the Police Union and give a statement about our stance on Councilman Kyle Anderson. A Town Council person is someone who is chosen to positively represent the town; someone that upholds the values of Woodbridge and its citizens. They are a public reflection of what the town is and ideally is supposed to be. Town Councilman Kyle Anderson has repeatedly shown his dislike, distrust and biases towards the Woodbridge Police. Several years ago Kyle Anderson was pulled over for a light out on his vehicle and he turned out to have a warrant. He was arrested by the Woodbridge Police for that warrant. He questioned why he was pulled over and claimed he was only pulled over because of his race and stated that he thought it was a setup by the police because of his race. That same Councilman, on many occasions, has posted polarizing topics about race and police on his personal Facebook page. One specifically saying he feels he has to worry about being shot and murdered by police due to his race. This is the type of opinion you want your Councilman to have here in Woodbridge? Your representative of Woodbridge he represents you as citizens. This post has since been removed. If nothing was wrong with this opinion or post then why

remove it. Recently Councilman Anderson was overheard at a protest again stating his opinion that he was to be very worried about being shot and murdered by police because of his race. When asked who he feels is racist in Woodbridge he then physically motioned to the nearby police officer. This was observed and commented on by a civilian as well as overheard and observed by police officers. When something happens one time it could be a misinterpreted incident, when a similar incident happens two times it may be an odd coincidence, but when that same type of bias incident towards police happens three times it is a trend and truly shows the antipolice opinion of the person it is coming from. Is this the type of person that the Township of Woodbridge wants representing it? Councilman Anderson stopped the antipolice rhetoric a negative race speech you constantly post on social media. It is not what Woodbridge needs, it is not what Woodbridge wants and not the Township of Woodbridge or the Police Department deserves. Thank you and God speed.

**KYLE ANDERSON, COUNCILMAN AT LARGE:**

Councilman Anderson: If I may I have a statement I would like to read. Mayor, Council and fellow



residents of Woodbridge Township there was a recent matter that involved my participation that I want to address. I woke up on Saturday, October 19<sup>th</sup> with intentions of attending my college homecoming but not before running a few errands with my family. I received a phone call from friend who was troubled by what he saw and heard at Pelzman Park. Apparently Mr. Tony Gallo who is running for Middlesex County Sheriff secured a permit to hold his rally there. My friend described the rally as hateful described as patriotic and was appalled by the signs on display as well as the speeches being delivered over the loudspeaker. This was on full display as children played in the playground. My friend had spoken out to express his opinion but was quickly shouted down and for fear of his own injuries stood down. The police were called but he was advised for his own safety to stand on the perimeter of the event which he did. With concern for my friend I drove to the park to see if he was okay and if it was as he described. When I arrived I met my friend; he was upset and visibly shaken. I saw what he described. It was a campaign rally full of bigotry and hatred. While the group was exercising their 1<sup>st</sup> Amendment rights I felt the signs were a little in poor taste so close to the children and families on the playground. I was so moved by my friend's action to speak as an individual against an angry crowd so I decided to stand with him for our friends will believe in our potential but your enemies will live up to it. I held a sign with words that I believed in and stood silently along with my friend Jimmy. I kept my silence for as long as I could while Jimmy peacefully spoke out. As the crowd grew restless with our presence insults with words that I would never call another human being were hauled in our direction. I eventually broke my silence and after about thirty minutes but I remained civil and challenged those insults with words of inclusion only to endure more insults. It proved that there is still an element in our society that exists that is resistant to change, diversity and inclusion. I was not there as a Councilman or a county superintendent but as a friend. As Dr. King once said the ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience but where he stands in times of challenge and controversy. The next day Mr. Gallo proved he is unfit for any position in public safety by smearing my image all over the internet asking for it to be shared which it was. However as an elected official I realized that that could happen to me. What I did not expect that Mr. Gallo would stoop to was sharing pictures of my wife, my daughter and my family along with my image and ask that it be shared too. How could anybody who inspires to hold a top law enforcement position in our county put others at risk like that. I protested his rally and he endangered my family. Mr. Tom Maras, who had left the rally prior to my arrival, irresponsibly wrote lies about what I did at that rally. He was not there but this is not unusual for Tom. However it does not surprise me at all that he would attend the bigoted hateful rally. What would you expect from a man who recently posted on his Facebook pictures of three prominent African American figures and dubbed them as a herd of wild ass Africans. Free speech always comes at a price. The price I paid most recently is an attack on my character and my integrity as a man. I am not perfect, I have made mistakes, and if you had gotten to know me you witnessed me owning up to them as I did when I was pulled over and never did I ever say that I was pulled over because of my race. I came here and praised the Woodbridge Police Department for how they handled that situation. I never once came in and said this was because of my race. I acknowledged that I paid my ticket, the ticket had not been processed and I took my punishment with handcuffs, had fingerprints and a mug shot and came back here and said that the Woodbridge Police Department did everything right. I built a level of trust with people who have elected me to my position as Councilman. I did that through effective communication. I am always willing to sit down and have a conversation with somebody. One good conversation can shift the direction and change forever. It has come to my attention that my attendance at this rally has generated a belief that I made unbecoming remarks about the Woodbridge Police Department. I am here to tell anybody who is listening I made no such remarks. I'm a supporter of the Woodbridge PD and always have been since the day that I was six years old and moved four houses away from my hero in life, Alvin P. Williams. I have written letters and emails in the past to commend individual officers and the department as a whole. I even joined forces with the Woodbridge

Police Department to pull off a Dream Project to help a young man I was sponsoring while he was battling cancer. When things like this get around it shakes you up. A balance and thoughtful conversation is the way to restore trust and keep your relationship strong. There are always two sides to every story. The best path to resolution is to come to a conversation with an open mind. I am always opened to having that conversation. According to my Facebook post ninety-five percent of my Facebook posts are about my family, my friends and the sports that my children play. Five percent of my Facebook posts I do reserve for open criticism for the tobacco industry, the pharmaceutical industry, Judges that have made inappropriate comments during sentencing or during trials, teachers, the educational industry or the educational system and how we need equity and yes there have been times when I have criticized the police but I have never mentioned Woodbridge Police in my posts that the Woodbridge Police are corrupt or the Woodbridge Police are racist; I've never mentioned that the Woodbridge Police are racist. I have praised the Woodbridge Police. In fact I just came from another event where my friend was being sworn in as a lieutenant in Perth Amboy just ten minutes before I got here. I'm a friend to many policemen; my cousins are policeman. My cousin who is a policeman is here now. My grandfather was a policeman so I don't know what the agenda is. You made it clear; you made it clear. The people that wrote about me online were ten feet away from me; the police officers were thirty feet away from me. Those people that were ten feet away from me had they heard a comment like that don't you think that they would have posted that. They didn't post it because they didn't hear it because I didn't say it; it was never said.
